This synopsis for Newport SACRE provides information about spiritual development, collective worship and any comments made in relation to religious education in the inspection reports of schools inspected in the local authority during 2017-2018.

This synopsis considers the inspection findings of one primary school.

Main findings Spiritual Development

Comments in relation to spiritual development are evident in the inspection report. The school gives pupils excellent opportunities to develop their understanding of a range of social skills, moral issues, and spiritual awareness, through collective worship and class activities

Collective Worship

Meeting statutory requirements

Quality

As a result, pupils' behaviour has improved over time and is now extremely good.	neighbouring nursing home. Almost all pupils raise money for a wide range of local, national and international charities regularly. For example, they have recently raised money for the haematology ward at a local hospital. They also raise money for good causes further afield, such as a charity to support children in Uganda. As a result, pupils develop an exceptional understanding of how to support people who are less fortunate than themselves and develop as ethical, informed citizens in highly effective ways. Staff pay particular attention to addressing the needs of vulnerable groups of pupils to ensure that they make at least good progress. The school provides these pupils with very beneficial interventions to help develop their skills. Staff use a range of nurturing principles, emotional and social skills to build identified pupils self-confidence. The school makes very effective use of a link with a partner school in Uganda to develop pupils' understanding of the lives of others in different parts of the world. Teachers give older pupils beneficial opportunities to learn about global issues. For example, they teach pupils about the Windrush generation to develop their understanding of the difficulties that migrants faced when settling in Britain.

The school places a strong emphasis on healthy eating and the physical and emotional wellbeing of pupils. Regular assemblies, an effective personal and social education curriculum and frequent opportunities for exercise help pupils to understand the importance of healthy lifestyles.
