1. Name and description of the policy / proposal being assessed. Outline the policy's purpose.

The purpose is to seek permission to take forward a school reorganisation proposal to expand Ysgol Bryn Derw and therefore provide additional pupil places by increasing the capacity of the school from 48 to 68 with effect from January 2020. This proposal is supported by capital funding from the Gwent Integrated Care Fund (ICF) Capital Investment Plan.

This proposal supports the increasing demand for specialist education provision across the city of Newport. The demand for places in ASD specialist provision, due to the identified needs of pupils currently in Newport schools, is higher than current provision available within the city.

The proposal will benefit pupils across the whole of Newport, as additional facilities will be provided to support children who have specialist needs in an appropriate and secure environment.

The publication of a statutory notice from 6th September to 4th October 2019 has enabled Newport City Council to seek any objections on the proposal.

2. Outline how you have/ will involve stakeholders who will be affected by the policy/proposal

The statutory notice period represented the opportunity for people to lodge objections to the proposal. The statutory proposal was published on the Newport City Council website and copies were displayed at all main entrances to Ysgol Bryn Derw. The notice was also shared with all stakeholders via email as outlined in the statutory School Organisation Code, including the pupils, staff and parents / carers of Ysgol Bryn Derw.

The consultation passed through this statutory notice stage without objection and therefore a final decision can now be taken by the Cabinet Member for Education and Skills.

The Council is keen to gain the views of learners when taking forward school reorganisation proposals. However, in this instance the Headteacher and Chair of Governors felt that it would not be appropriate to engage with pupils currently attending Ysgol Bryn Derw during the consultation stage due to their specific additional learning needs. Pupils at the school, all of whom have a diagnosis of Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD), have high anxiety levels, struggle with change, are confused by the unknown, and can be unpredictable. Given the fact that the proposal was only at the statutory notice stage, and in light of the considerations above pupil engagement was not undertaken. They will however be fully engaged and consulted in the refurbishment plans if the proposal is taken forward.

3. What information/evidence do you have on stakeholders? e.g. views, needs, service usage etc. Please include all the evidence you consider relevant.

The statutory School Organisation Code outlines the key stakeholders who should be consulted with as part of this process. This list is not exclusive however, and the Council has identified and added to this as a result of feedback received in relation to previous proposals.

These stakeholder groups will include pupils, parents, carers, Headteachers and Governing Bodies of Newport Schools, school staff, Newport City Council elected members and Estyn.

Pupils at the school, all of whom have a diagnosis of Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD), have high anxiety levels, struggle with change, are confused by the unknown, and can be unpredictable.

Following the statutory notice period, the FEIA has been updated.

5 How has your proposal embedded and prioritised the sustainable development principle in its development?

Long Term Balancing short term need with long term needs	Ysgol Bryn Derw was established in September 2017 to create a special school providing 48 full-time school places for children with ASD and associated learning difficulties across the Nursery to Year 14 groups (3-19 age range).
	As per the January 2018 Pupil Level Annual School Census (PLASC) submission, there were 47 children registered as attending the school. The last remaining place was allocated for a September 2018 admission.
	A re-assessment of the school capacity in the summer term of 2018 identified that an additional 8 pupils could potentially be accommodated from September 2018. All the original and additional places were filled in September 2018 and a waiting list is now in place. The school is therefore oversubscribed in the second year of opening.
	The current pupil cohort indicates that there will potentially be no further movement out of the school for another four years as the oldest pupils are currently in Year 10. Given this position, and the fact that pupils can remain on roll at the school until the age of 19, there will be limited opportunities to admit further pupils during the forthcoming academic years. This could lead to those pupils currently needing a specialist ASD placement who are in our local Primary LRBs having to be placed in out of county provisions, which are costly and can be a significant distance away from a pupil's home address.
	The proposal will benefit pupils across the whole of the Newport as additional facilities will be provided to support children who have specialist needs in an appropriate and secure environment.
	The Council has submitted a bid to the Welsh Government Integrated Care Fund (ICF) Capital Investment Plan for Gwent for full capital funding to undertake this project. The outcomes of the project clearly support two of the priorities set out by the Children & Families Strategic Partnership namely:
Collaboration Working together to deliver objectives	To improve outcomes for children and young people with complex needs through earlier intervention, community based support and placement closer to home.
	To increase the support available to children and families with complex needs to reduce the number of out of county placements and increase number of young people provided skills for living.

Sustainable Does your proposal demonstrate you have met this Development principle? Describe how. **Principle** There is predicted to be an on-going demand for placements at Ysgol Bryn Derw across Newport. Increasing provision will reduce the number of future out-of-county placements and will also support more pupils being able to be educated within the city. **Prevention** Putting resources into preventing problems occurring or getting worse The Council firmly believes that this proposal will have a positive impact on the provision and quality of educational outcomes in the special school sector. Ysgol Bryn Derw is already well equipped to deliver a full curriculum across all year groups from Nursery to Year 14, and increasing the number of places available within the school community will not have any detrimental impact on this provision. The proposal will result in additional facilities being provided to support children who have specialist needs in an appropriate and secure environment. Perceived benefits of the proposal include: Provision of additional specialist education places in an Integration appropriate dedicated school where placement in supported Considering mainstream environments is not deemed appropriate; impact on all The subsequent potential availability of places in LRBs to wellbeing goals support pupils who require supported mainstream together and on environments; other bodies Development of an existing school site; Reduction in current and / or future out-of-county placements and an opportunity for pupils who are currently attending out-ofcounty provision to re-integrate back into their local area to continue their education: Reduced travel time for pupils who are attending out-of-county placements: Provision of a wider range of spaces for pupils with ASD who find noisy and busy areas difficult.

6 Will the proposal/policy have a disproportionate impact on a specific geographical area of Newport?

Ysgol Bryn Derw is already an established school accessible to pupils across the city. The proposal supports the development of additional facilities without any detrimental impact on provision at the school, and indeed at any other school within the City. This proposal will benefit pupils across the whole of the Newport as additional facilities will be provided to support children who have specialist needs in an appropriate and secure environment.

7 How does the proposal/policy relate to the parameters of debate about Fairness identified by the Newport Fairness Commission

Parameter 1 – Equal treatment while recognising difference

The proposal recognises that the children affected by the proposal require a different style of education whilst given them the same opportunities to receive a rich and nurturing education as all other children have the opportunity to in Newport.

Parameter 2 – Mutual Obligations between citizens and government

Ysgol Bryn Derw does not have a catchment area. It is primarily used to accommodate pupils residing within Newport, although if spaces exist, there is a facility to allow neighbouring LAs to purchase vacant places for their pupils. Pupils are not able to apply for a place at Ysgol Bryn Derw via the Council's usual admission arrangements. Instead, admission is based on individual need following an assessment undertaken by the Education Inclusion Team. All pupils attending the school have a statement of Special Educational Needs. The Council determines admission taking parental preference into consideration and following consultation with the Headteacher and Governing Body as to the appropriateness of the placement.

Parameter 3 – Interdependency and reciprocity within community relations Perceived benefits of the proposal include:

- Provision of additional specialist education places in an appropriate dedicated school where placement in supported mainstream environments is not deemed appropriate;
- Potential availability of places in Learning Resource Bases to support pupils who require supported mainstream environments;
- Development of an existing school site;
- Reduction in current and / or future out-of-county placements and an opportunity for pupils
 who are currently attending out-of-county provision to re-integrate back into their local area
 to continue their education;
- Reduced travel time for pupils who are attending out-of-county placements;
- Provision of a wider range of spaces for pupils with ASD who find noisy and busy areas difficult.

Parameter 4 – Transparency and accountability in decision making

The consultation document outlines the decision making process and is transparent and accountable in the information provided. It allows the effective democratic participation of citizens.

8 Taking this assessment as a whole, what could be done to mitigate any negative impacts of your policy and better contribute to positive impacts?

Although unlikely, if demand for provision diminishes, the school could be adapted to accommodate pupils with other additional learning needs from within the special school sector. If demand for provision increases, the Assistant Head of Education (Inclusion) will continue to plan for future provision across the City.

9 Monitoring, evaluating and reviewing

Any objections made throughout the statutory notice process would be recorded in an Objection report, although there have been no objections during the statutory notice period.

Following the objection period, Newport City Council's Cabinet Member for Education & Skills will make the final decision for the implementation of the proposal.

10 Involvement

The statutory notice period represented the opportunity for people to lodge legal objections to the proposal. The statutory proposal was published on the Newport City Council website and copies were displayed at all main entrances to Ysgol Bryn Derw. The notice was also shared with all stakeholders as outlined in the statutory School Organisation Code, including the pupils, staff and parents / carers of Ysgol Bryn Derw.
