**Summary** Under the Crime and Disorder Act (1998) each local authority in England and Wales were given the responsibility to formulate and implement a plan/strategy to reduce crime and disorder in their area through the local Community Safety Partnership.

This responsibility includes undertaking a Strategic Needs Assessment for Community Safety. The primary goal of this assessment is to pinpoint the underlying causes, patterns, and significant community safety issues, such as Anti-Social Behaviour, Serious Violence, Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse, and Sexual Violence.

To discharge the Council's duties under the above legislation, a draft Safer Newport Community Strategic Needs Assessment and Community Safety Plan has been produced and is appended to this report, for consideration and approval by members. These drafts were approved by Cabinet in June 2024.

# Background

## Legal Context

Under the Crime and Disorder Act (1998) each local authority in England and Wales were given the responsibility to formulate and implement a plan/strategy to reduce crime and disorder in their area through the local Community Safety Partnership.

This responsibility includes undertaking a Strategic Needs Assessment for Community Safety. The primary goal of this assessment is to pinpoint the underlying causes, patterns, and significant community safety issues, such as Anti-Social Behaviour, Serious Violence, Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse, and Sexual Violence.

Safer Newport aims to ensure a partnership approach to preventing and tackling aspects of community safety across all areas of Newport and works closely with related boards and forums including the Gwent Violence Against Women Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence (VAWDASV) Board, the Area Planning Board and Counter Terrorism processes.

## Community Safety Partnership (CSP)

Membership of Safer Newport includes Gwent Police, Newport City Council, South Wales Fire and Rescue Service (SWFRS), Aneurin Bevan University Health Board (ABUHB) and the National Probation Service. The Partnership is jointly chaired by Gwent Police and Newport City Council

## Development of the Plan

A Strategic Needs Assessment for Community Safety involves a comprehensive examination of various elements impacting community safety within a specific geographic area overseen by the local authority. The primary goal of this assessment is to pinpoint the underlying causes, patterns, and significant community safety issues, including but not limited to Anti-Social Behaviour, Serious Violence, Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse, and Sexual Violence. Through the analysis of both quantitative and qualitative data, it equips Safer Newport with a profound understanding of the problem at hand.

The Strategic Needs Assessment plays a pivotal role in determining the necessary resources, policies, and strategies required to effectively prevent and address community safety concerns. It is recognised that collaborative efforts between Safer Newport, Gwent Police, Aneurin Bevan University Health Board (ABUHB), Youth Justice Service (YJS), South Wales Fire and Rescue Service (SWFR), and other stakeholders are indispensable for devising a targeted and evidence-based approach to addressing recurrent community safety issues.

The Strategic Needs Assessment provides an evaluation of the current picture of community safety in Newport, based on quantitative data from various agencies and qualitative insights from citizens and partners.

Analysis of the assessment has identified three priority areas for the Safer Newport Partnership:

- Serious violence and organised crime
- Anti-social behaviour
- Vulnerable groups

It also highlights some emerging themes that need further monitoring and analysis, such as e-bikes and scooters, cannabis grows, and illegal vaping.

It is important to note that while Safer Newport takes direct action in response to this Strategic Needs Assessment (SNA), various supporting Boards and Strategic Groups also share responsibility for implementing measures to enhance community safety.

## Governance

The draft assessment and plan was approved by the Cabinet in June 2024.

The delivery of the plan will be underpinned by operational delivery plans developed by each of the priority subgroup with quarterly reports provided to Safer Newport, which will monitor and support progress against the objectives throughout the year.

In addition, annual reports summarising the progress will be compiled at the end of every financial year for Scrutiny Committee and Council.

### **Financial Summary (Capital and Revenue)**

The cost of implementing the Safer Newport Plan is met out of existing budgets by each relevant service area.

### **Comments of Head of People, Policy and Transformation**

The Strategic Needs Assessment (SNA) is an in-depth evaluation of a variety of factors that contribute to community safety within the local authority area. This assessment aims to identify root causes, trends, and key community safety themes. It is based on an analysis of quantitative and qualitative data with the aim of giving the Safer Newport Community Safety Partnership a better understanding of local issues. The SNA brings together data sets from a range of community safety partners and is also based on major public engagement work to determine concerns, perceptions of crime and lived experience. This has helped identified the three priority areas of serious organised crime, antisocial behaviour, and vulnerable groups.

The SNA helps Safer Newport determine the resources, policies, and strategies needed to effectively prevent and address community safety issues. The assessment also provides a basis for a strategic approach to take forward the Wellbeing of Future Generations Act 2015 and the wellbeing goals set out in it.

There are no direct human resources implications associated with this report.

### **Scrutiny Committees**

The draft Safer Newport Strategic Needs Assessment 2023 and Safer Newport Plan 2024 -2029 was presented to the Council's Partnerships Scrutiny Committee on 20 March 2024. The full details will be published in the minutes of the Committee meeting on the Council's democracy pages.

The Committee thanked officers for their work and made the following comments and recommendations:

- The Committee praised the report's presentation and accessibility, noting that it was well-presented and easily understandable. Additionally, they commended the effort to distribute the report in multiple languages, recognising the importance of reaching a diverse audience and ensuring inclusivity in communication.
- The committee emphasised the importance of recognising the safety and security of individuals living in rural areas as being equally significant as in urban areas. It was suggested that safety concerns in rural areas should not be overlooked or forgotten, indicating a need for specific attention and measures to address safety issues in these communities.
- The Committee requested to receive a data pack of the information about areas of residence which was collected during the public engagement but was not contained within the report to enhance their understanding of the geographical distribution and associated safety concerns within Newport.
- The Committee expressed concern about the low engagement rate from diverse communities. Despite the survey being translated into multiple languages and efforts to reach out to community groups, participation remained low. The Committee recommended exploring ways to improve engagement with these communities to ensure their perspectives and concerns are adequately represented.

In line with Council's Partnerships Scrutiny Committee recommendations, the committee have been sent a full data pack and future iterations of any Community Safety SNA will explore ways to improve engagement with residents from all communities.

In terms of the Wellbeing of Future Generation (Wales) Act and consideration of the sustainable development principle, 5 ways of working:

**Long Term** - The delivery of the Community Safety plan and associated actions aim to influence the way that the Council makes decisions that have a long-term impact on communities.

**Preventative** – The Community Safety Plan seeks to not only respond the current needs but to also consider wider thematic trends to ensure that preventative measures can be taken and implemented.

**Integration** – While the Community Safety Plan cuts across all of Wales well-being goals, this plan will particularly support progress to achieve the vision for A Wales of cohesive communities. Similarly, the delivery of this plan and work within this area align with and contribute to achieving the well-being objectives in the Council's new Corporate Plan.

**Collaboration** - Collaboration is key to delivering against the Community Safety Plan. As a Community Safety Partnership, collaboration is at the heart of all that is done. This is seen in every associated group by working as a multi agency partnership. Safer Newport also ensure that this work is community focused and will continue to seek engagement and participation from the residents of Newport.

**Involvement** – The Council engaged with a wide range of internal and external stakeholders in the development of this plan. Engagement and consultation with key stakeholders, including Newport residents, Safer Newport members, all of which will remain vital collaborators throughout the delivery of this plan.

### **Crime and Disorder Act 1998**

Under the Crime and Disorder Act (1998) each local authority in England and Wales were given the responsibility to formulate and implement a plan/strategy to reduce crime and disorder in their area through the local Community Safety Partnership. The associated Strategic Needs Assessment and Plan detailed in this report meets this requirement.

### **Consultation**

In addition to working with partners to access and understand data we also conducted perception surveys with residents and other stakeholders. These took the form of online and paper surveys and in person events with communities across the city. Overall we received over 3600 responses, the results of which are contained within the Strategic Needs Assessment.
